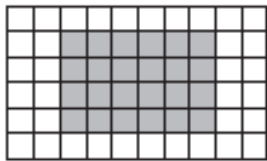

Understanding Area

The area of a figure can be found in two ways.

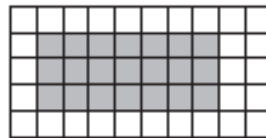
A **square unit** is a square with sides that are each 1 unit long.



□ = 1 square inch

Count the square units in the shaded rectangle. There are 24 squares shaded. So, the area of the rectangle is 24 square inches.

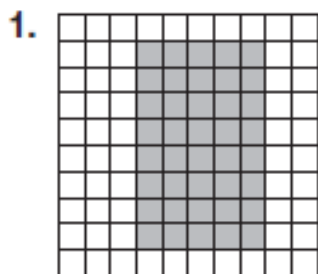
You can think of the grid squares as an array.



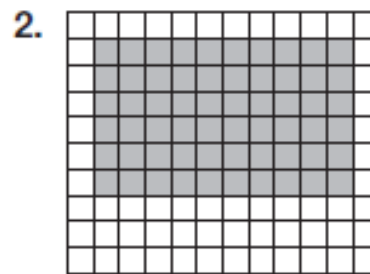
□ = 1 square centimeter

Each row has 7 squares. There are 3 rows, so multiply $3 \times 7 = 21$. The area of the rectangle is 21 square centimeters.

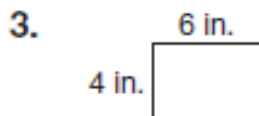

GABRIELLE DOUGLAS



Gabrielle (Gabby) Douglas is a gymnast. She was born on December 31, 1995 in Virginia Beach, Virginia. She has three siblings.

Gabby's sister got her interested in gymnastics when she was three. She began taking gymnastics lessons when she was five, and she won her first state championship when she was eight.

When Gabby was 14, she moved away from her family to train in Iowa. It was bittersweet, because she missed her family a lot. Gabby became well-known in gymnastics in 2010. She was very good at the uneven bars and floor exercise. Her nickname was "The Flying Squirrel", because she is able to fly high in the air.

In 2012, Gabby competed in the Olympics for the first time. She was 16. With her 6 teammates, she won the team gold medal. She also won the individual all-around gold medal. She is the first African American woman to win an individual all-around medal in gymnastics. She was also the first woman to win both the team gold medal and the individual gold medal. In 2016, she won the team gold medal at the Rio de Janeiro Olympics.

Dr. Seuss: Helping Kids Learn to Read



Dr. Seuss was born on March 2, 1904. He was an American cartoonist and writer. His real name was Theodor Seuss Geisel. He was born in Springfield, Massachusetts.

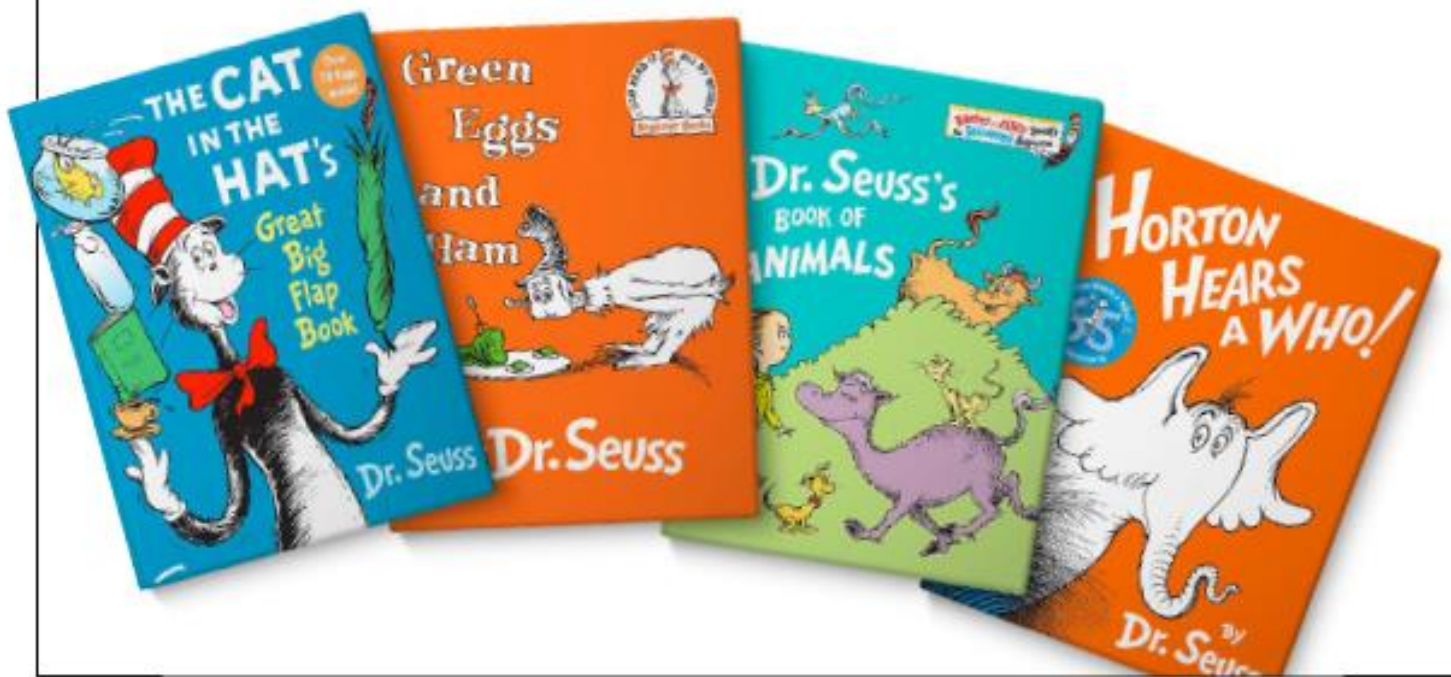
Dr. Seuss liked to draw and write, even as a child. The first book that Dr. Seuss wrote was titled, *And To Think That I Saw It On Mulberry Street*. He wrote it while on an ocean voyage, returning from a trip to Europe. The rhythm of the ship's engine gave him the feeling for the poetry rhythm in the story!

Dr. Seuss was not a real doctor. He added the "Dr." to his name to honor his dad, who wanted Theodor to finish his doctoral degree. Even though he never became a

real doctor, he did write books that helped millions of kids learn to read. Dr. Seuss had also used other names, or "pen names," to write books. These names include Theophrastus Seuss, Theo LeSieg (which is his real name spelled backwards), and Rosetta Stone.

Dr. Seuss wrote more than 60 children's books, including some which have been made into movies, such as *The Cat in the Hat*, *Horton Hears a Who*, and *How the Grinch Stole Christmas*.

Dr. Seuss wrote lots of books for children, even though he and his wife never had children of their own. He died at age 87, in San Diego, California.



Abraham Lincoln



Lincoln was born in a log cabin in Kentucky.

Abraham Lincoln was born in a one-room log cabin in 1809. His family lived in the Kentucky wilderness. The cabin had a single window and a dirt floor.



When he was 7 years old, Lincoln's family moved to Indiana. Abe continued to work hard. He became an expert with an ax. He cleared the woods for farming. He cut and split firewood. He split logs into rails for fences. Abe was better with an ax than anyone around, but he would rather read. He read every book he could find or borrow. He once walked six miles for a book!

When Lincoln was about 21, his family moved to Illinois. Abe was elected to the state legislature. He helped make laws for the state of Illinois.



Lincoln spoke out against slavery.

During this time, many people were slaves in the American South. Slaves were not allowed to choose their jobs or where they worked. They worked hard for no pay and were often treated cruelly. Lincoln was opposed to slavery. He gave many speeches about how wrong it was.

Abraham Lincoln became president in 1861. Many Southerners were outraged. They were afraid that the United States would tell them to give up their slaves. They thought states should be able to make their own laws, so they made their own country. Lincoln wanted to keep the country together. The Civil War was a battle between the North and South. It lasted four years, and the North won.

During the war, Lincoln signed the Emancipation Proclamation. This important document set millions of slaves free. Sadly, a few days after the war ended, Lincoln was shot and killed.



Lincoln is on the front of the penny. The Lincoln Memorial is on the back.

Abraham Lincoln was one of the greatest presidents of the United States. We honor him with a magnificent building called the Lincoln Memorial.
